April is Spring Cleanup Month



The City of Laurel has designated the month of April as Spring Cleanup Month!

Mayor Craig A. Moe wants to make sure you know about a few special programs to help you spruce up your home, business or neighborhood:

Public Works will hold an Electronics Recycling and Paper Shredding Event, for City residents and businesses only, on April 22nd from 8:00am – Noon at the Public Works Facility located at 305-307 First Street.

The City will increase the yard debris collection service to every Monday and Wednesday during the month of April and residential special pickup collection will be available every Wednesday.

The City of Laurel will also waive the \$10 base fee on the 2nd and 4th Wednesdays in April for the first 100 residents that schedule a special pickup. All other fees such as the large appliances and furniture fees and tire fees will remain in effect. As always, there is no fee for yard debris collection.

Arrangements for a special pickup of bulk trash and yard debris can be made by calling the Department of Public Works at 301-725-0088, through the MyLaurel App or by e-mail at dpw@laurel.md.us. The deadline for scheduling a Monday pickup is the close of business on Thursday, the deadline for scheduling a Wednesday pickup is the close of business on Monday.

We hope you'll take advantage of these opportunities to make Laurel just a little more beautiful.

10 Tips for Home Safety

-  Create the illusion that someone is at your house if you're away! Leave a TV or stereo on in a room and use exterior lighting and motion detectors to minimize burglar concealment.
-  Make sure all exterior doors have good, sturdy lock. Install 1-inch deadbolt locks on all exterior doors.
-  If you get an unexpected knock at the door, check to see who it before opening it.
-  DO NOT leave extra keys under doormats, potted plants or any other outdoor location. Thieves will find them. Give a set to a trusted neighbor or family member.
-  Burglar proof your glass patio doors by setting a metal bar in the middle, bottom track of the door slide.
-  Keep drapes and blinds shut and DO NOT leave your garage door open, even when you're home.
-  Don't leave notes on the door for service people or family. This alerts anyone that you are not home.

Driving Safety Tips for Seniors

-  Avoid driving at night if you have trouble with night vision.
-  Keep your windshield, headlights and mirror clean to improve visibility.
-  Limit distracting noise inside your vehicle.
-  Keep a safe distance between you and the car ahead so you can brake safely.
-  Stay alert and watch for flashing lights of emergency vehicles.
-  Get periodic vision and hearing tests.
-  Take a defensive driving course offered through AARP or AAA.
-  Read medication labels to see if they impair driving skills.
-  Avoid driving during inclement weather.
-  Don't drive if you are feeling tired, lightheaded or stressed.

Keep Your Children Safe

- Children should know their full name, home phone number and how to use the telephone.
- Choose babysitters with care. Obtain references from family , friends and neighbors.
- Make a list of neighborhood boundaries and let your children know whose homes they are allowed to visit.
- DO NOT drop your children off alone at malls, parks or movie theatres.
- Tell your children if you are approached by an adult, stay alert. Could be a trick!
- NEVER leave your child unattended in a vehicle.
- Children should never go anywhere without your permission first.
- Be careful when you put your child's name on clothing, backpacks, lunch boxes or bike license plates. This may put them on a "first name" basis with an abductor

What documentation is required?

Proof of U.S. Citizenship

1. A previous U.S. Passport.
2. If you were born in the U.S., a certified copy of your birth certificate issued by the State, County or City of your birth.
3. If you were born abroad, bring a certificate of naturalization, or a certificate of birth abroad.
4. All children, 15 years and under, must appear with a parent or legal guardian.

Proof of Identity

1. A previous U.S. Passport.
2. A certificate of naturalization or citizenship.
3. A valid driver's license, government or military ID or other photo ID.

Two (2) identical full front poses, 2" by 2" color photographs on white or light-colored backgrounds.

Main Street Economic Development Programs

The City encourages business and property owners to take advantage of the Main Street Economic Development Programs. The Main Street Relocation Grant is available to apparel and shoes stores, bakeries, coffee shops, full service and fine dining restaurants, gourmet food shops, grocery stores, health clubs and yoga studios, ice cream shops, and entertainment businesses. Business owners can receive a grant of up to \$10,000. The Retail Storefront Façade Improvement grant will allow property owners with a grant of up to \$5,000 to make renovations to the exterior of their commercial properties.



Fire Marshal/Permit Services

Summer is almost here and spring is in full swing! Along with the nice weather, comes property maintenance and activities that can sometimes prove dangerous. Below, please find helpful information that will help keep you and your family safe during the spring and summer:

Camping

When purchasing a tent, be sure that the tent is flame retardant. Never place the tent or any other gear near a campfire. Never use fuel burning heaters or lanterns inside the tent. Always use battery operated heating and lighting devices. Before leaving your campsite or going to sleep, be sure you properly extinguish the campfire by pouring water on it or covering it with dirt.

Gas and Charcoal Grill Safety

Fire up the grill! Everyone loves a cookout! However, propane and charcoal BBQ grills must only be used outdoors. Keep children and pets away from the grill area: declare a three-foot "safe zone" around the grill. Put out several long-handled grilling tools to give the chef plenty of clearance from heat and flames when flipping burgers. Periodically, remove grease or fat buildup in trays below grill so it cannot be ignited by a hot grill.



Charcoal grills - Purchase the proper starter fluid and store the can out of reach of children, and away from heat sources.

Propane grills - Check the gas cylinder hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year.

Fireworks

Always leave fireworks to the professionals. Stay at least 500 feet away from professional fireworks displays. If you happen to find fireworks do NOT touch them. Contact the City of Laurel Fire Marshal's Office at 301-725-5300 Ext. 2250 or Laurel Police Department non-emergency line at 301-498-0092. For emergencies involving fireworks, call 911 immediately. It is illegal to sell or use fireworks within the City limits of Laurel and Prince George's County.

Bike and Pedestrian Safety

Whether you choose to take a bike ride around the lake or a nice trip through the park, there are some points to keep in mind to ensure you or your child's safety: always wear a helmet and wear bright clothes and/or putting reflectors on your bike also can help you stay safe, especially at night. Daytime riding is the safest so try to avoid riding your bike at dusk and later.



Tall Grass Reminder

Grass will be growing! It is the duty of every person as owner, occupant, lessee or agent in charge of land in the City to cut to a height of not over eight (8) inches. To report tall weeds log on to our website at www.cityoflaurel.org and click on MyLaurel Mobile App or call 301-725-5300 extension 2238.

Public Works

 **Spring Clean-Up!** During the month of April, Public Works will be collecting **yard debris on Mondays and Wednesdays**. To schedule a collection, call in or e-mail before the end of the day Thursday for a Monday collection and before the end of the day Monday for a Wednesday collection. To reach us by phone call 301-725-0088 or e-mail us at (dpw@laurel.md.us) or use the City of Laurel app. Public Works will also be offering four residential special pickups throughout the month. The Mayor has approved a base fee waiver for **April 12th and April 26th**. The first 100 residents will receive a \$10 discount – if you don't have any "billable" items – the pickup is **FREE**. To schedule a collection, you need to contact Public Works by the end of the day on the Monday before the collection.

Electronics and Paper Shredding. The City will hold its electronics recycling and paper shredding event, Saturday, April 22nd from 8:00am to Noon at the Public Works Facility at 305-307 First Street. City residents are encouraged to recycle their unwanted electronics (computer monitors, CPUs, CD/DVD/VCR players, radios, printers, keyboard, televisions, etc.). Residents will also be able to securely shred any sensitive paper material (canceled checks, bank statements, bills, etc.). Residents will be required to show proof of City residency.

April showers may bring May flowers, but it makes for very soggy recycling. Wet paper and cardboard not only sticks to the inside of your container, but it makes for heavy lifting for our crews. If you are still using an open bin – contact Public Works and request a toter. Remember it is **free** to upgrade to a 35- or 65-gallon toter.

Mosquito Control Program – the City's mosquito control program will begin in April and will continue throughout the summer. If mosquitoes are your problem – you can find information about how to control the mosquito problem in your neighborhood and the City's Mosquito Control Program -- on the City's website – under Public Works Mosquito Control.

National Public Works Week is May 21 – 27, 2017. National Public Works Week (NPWW) is a celebration of the tens of thousands of men and women in North America who provide and maintain the infrastructure and services collectively known as public works. Instituted as a public education campaign by the American Public Works Association (APWA) in 1960, NPWW calls attention to the importance of public works in community life. The Week seeks to enhance the prestige of the often-unsung heroes of our society—the professionals who serve the public good every day with quiet dedication.

Tree plantings. Residents can expect to see Public Works crews out and about planting trees in the public right-of-way. If you want to know if you can expect a new tree in your neighborhood, call Tommy Helms, Project Inspector at 301-725-0088.

Roadway Markings. Yellow lines, bikeway markings, stop bars and crosswalks, Public Works does it all. Painting season has begun – watch out for Public Works crews working on the streets!

Also, make sure you have all of the documents and payments needed to process your packet, so we can get you in and out as quickly as possible.
