Advocating for Awareness

City Council Shows Overwhelming Support for Eric's Law, Advocates for Nonapparent Disability Protections Ahead of 2025 Legislative Session

As the 2025 Maryland General Assembly session approaches, the City Council is lending strong support to Eric's Law, a proposed bill that aims to protect individuals with nonapparent disabilities by allowing them to indicate their condition on state-issued identification, such as driver's licenses. Though the bill was introduced during the 2024 legislative session, it did not make it out of committee. Now, the council is urging state legislators to revisit and pass this essential measure, which they believe would bridge critical communication gaps between individuals with invisible disabilities and law enforcement officials.

Eric's Law, named after Eric Carpenter-Granham, is the brainchild of Carpenter-Granham himself, who recognized the difficulties faced by individuals with nonapparent disabilities, such as autism, mental health concerns, and hearing impairments, in high-stakes interactions with law enforcement. The bill proposes a special "ND" (Nonapparent Disability) designation on IDs, allowing quick and clear identification of those with conditions that might affect communication, cognition, and emotional regulation. Councilmembers hope this measure will reduce misunderstandings and help prevent dangerous situations for individuals whose disabilities are not immediately visible.

"Eric's Law is an essential step toward ensuring our residents with nonapparent disabilities are respected and understood in every interaction, especially with law enforcement," Mayor Sydnor stated. "Our community stands behind this bill, and I am fully committed to raising awareness and pushing for its passage in Annapolis. Together, we can make Maryland a safer and more inclusive place for all."

To further assist with identification, Eric's Law would include specific logos on driver's licenses, college IDs, library cards, and other IDs as a visual cue for disabilities like autism, mental health concerns, and hearing impairments. These logos would serve as a tool to facilitate safer interactions and help law enforcement and community members recognize and understand the unique needs of individuals with nonapparent disabilities.

The Council is hopeful that, through early advocacy, Maryland state delegates, including Senators William C. Smith, Jr., Esquire, Michael A. Jackson, and Delegate Lesley J. Lopez—sponsors of the original bills (SB1096 and HB1456)—will bring Eric's Law back to the floor in 2025 with renewed support. Councilmembers expressed their commitment to assisting in advancing this vital legislation and are optimistic that the Maryland General Assembly will recognize the bill's value to both the community and law enforcement.

Mayor Sydnor Launches First-Time Homebuyer Assistance Program

Empowering Laurel Residents to Achieve the Dream of Homeownership

The City of Laurel is excited to announce the launch of its new *First-Time Homebuyer Assistance Program*, spearheaded by Mayor Keith R. Sydnor. This initiative is designed to provide financial support to individuals and families looking to purchase their first home within the city limits. With homeownership being a vital step toward building wealth and stability, the program aims to make this milestone more accessible for those who may need extra help.

The City has allocated \$60,000 from its FY2025 budget to fund the program, offering \$5,000 grants to 12 eligible first-time homebuyers. These grants can be used toward down payments or closing costs on a single-family home, townhouse, or condominium within the city. The program reflects Laurel's ongoing commitment to empowering residents and promoting long-term investment in the community.

Mayor Sydnor highlighted the program's importance, stating, "Owning a home is not just a milestone, it's an investment in the future—both for individuals and for our community. The City of Laurel is committed to providing the resources necessary to help families achieve this dream and to strengthen our city's neighborhoods. This program is a testament to our belief in Laurel's bright future and our residents' ability to thrive."

Program Highlights

- » The program is open to qualified first-time homebuyers who settle on a home between October 1, 2024, and June 30, 2025.
- » The purchased home must be located within the City of Laurel limits and must be the applicant's primary residence for at least three years.
- » Household income at the time of settlement must not exceed \$100,000.

Interested applicants will need to provide key documents, including proof of income and a settlement statement, before receiving the grant. Full details on eligibility and application requirements are available on the City's website at www.cityoflaurel.org.

Laurel's Trick or Treat on Main Street Brings Community Together


