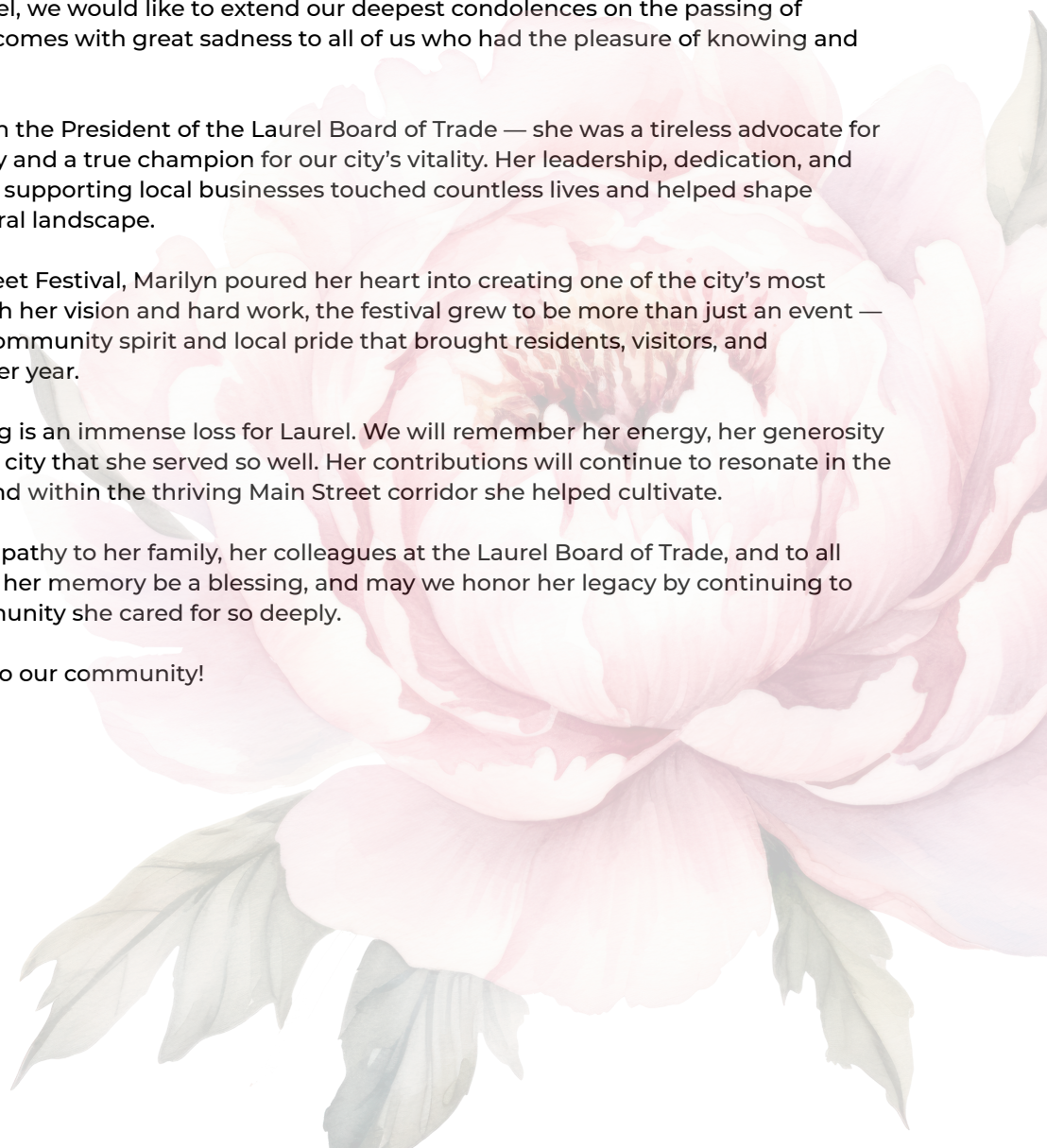

Special Announcement Speed Cameras Now Active in Designated Enforcement Zones

As of June 9, 2025, new speed enforcement cameras are officially active in select areas of the community. This initiative is part of a broader effort to improve traffic safety and reduce incidents of speeding on local roadways.

“Photo Enforced” signs were installed in advance of the cameras on June 2 to notify drivers of the upcoming enforcement. The following locations are now under active speed monitoring:

Camera Locations:

- Southbound Route 1 at Main Street
- Route 198 at Tenth Street

Speeding remains one of the leading causes of traffic accidents nationwide. These cameras are intended to promote compliance with posted speed limits and to enhance safety for drivers, pedestrians, and cyclists alike. “With the installation of these new speed cameras, our goal is simple — we want our sidewalks, roadways, and, most importantly, our pedestrians to be safer,” says Laurel Deputy Chief Mark Plazinski. “These locations were chosen based on a survey conducted by the Department of Public Works, and we’re committed to using every tool available to reduce speeding and enhance public safety.”

Residents and visitors are encouraged to remain alert and drive within speed limits, particularly in these newly enforced zones. The city thanks all motorists for doing their part to support a safer and more responsible driving environment.

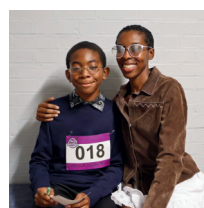
Improving Literacy Across the City Laurel Kicks Off Next Bestseller Contest

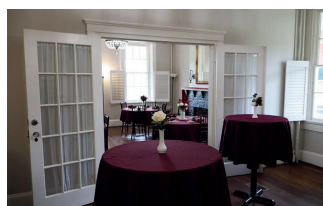

Celebrating 40 Years of Inclusion

The Legacy of the Special Olympics and Maryland's Champions



Each June, the City of Laurel comes together to support the Special Olympics and the athletes who represent Maryland in the annual games. On Thursday, June 5th, Mayor Keith R. Sydnor joined the Olympians and Laurel Police department on a five-mile run through the city to raise awareness. The group took photos with employees wearing Special Olympics shirts at the Joseph R. Robison Municipal Center and high-fived Laurel Elementary students along the path through the city.

The Special Olympics began in 1968, when Eunice Kennedy Shriver, motivated by her sister Rosemary's experiences and the unfairness encountered by people with intellectual disabilities, held the first International Special Olympics Summer Games in Chicago. Special Olympics Maryland (SOMD) was officially created two years later, in 1970. Maryland athletes compete in 27 sports on the local, state, national, and international levels.

"I am proud to be a part of the Torch Run as an officer, certified coach of Special Olympics Maryland, and as a parent of a Special Olympic athlete. The best part of the day is hanging out with Ben and Will and their families," said Captain Jordan Perretta, Laurel Police Department.

Behind every athlete is a network of volunteers, coaches, families, and donors. The Laurel Police Department has played a pivotal role through the Torch Run, raising awareness and selling merchandise to raise funds to support year-round sports programming.

"In 2005, I was told to run in the annual torch run. I thought it was just a run and didn't really understand who it benefited. One year, a few of us decided to stay after the Dunk Weekend and participate in the medal presentations at the SOMD Winter Games. That week I saw firsthand the smiling faces and excitement from the athletes, that changed everything for me," said Captain Erik Lynn of the Laurel Police Department.

The 2025 Maryland Special Olympics will be held from June 20th – June 22nd at Towson University.

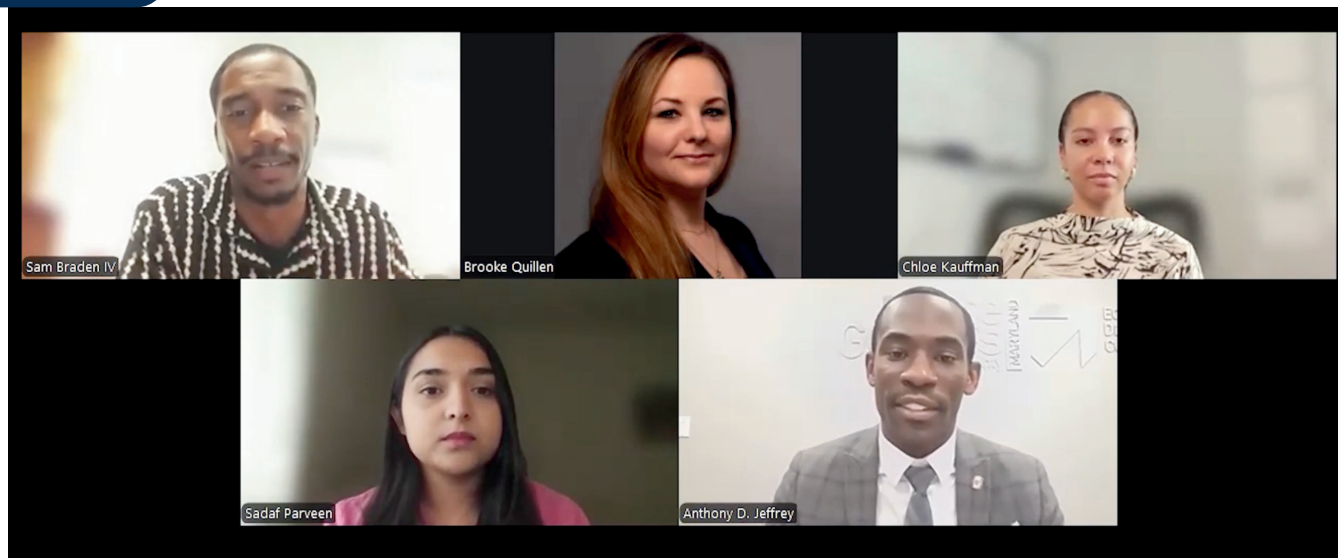

Disaster Planning

Planning for Your Pet: National Pet Preparedness Month

June is National Pet Preparedness Month, which was established by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina (2005). This devastating hurricane highlighted the significant impact natural disasters can have on pets and their owners. Many pets were lost, left behind, or inadequately cared for. FEMA recognized the need to learn from these mistakes, improve emergency plans, and, not only ensure pet safety, but include pets as part of evacuation strategies. By integrating pet preparedness into a community's preparedness, FEMA aims to ensure that pet owners and responders have the knowledge and tools to better protect our furry, feathered, and scaly friends.

It is important to know that natural disasters, which no two are alike, can happen unexpectedly and without warning. Therefore, like human family members, pets need detailed emergency plans tailored to their specific needs. In observance of National Pet Preparedness Month, the City of Laurel's Department of Emergency Management is encouraging pet owners to develop emergency plans, build a pet emergency kit, and understand how and when to evacuate or shelter pets.



Pet Emergency Kit

In addition to the family's emergency kit, pets should have a kit specifically tailored their needs. Consult with your pet's veterinarian to ensure you consider your pet's needs based on their species, breed, size, and medical conditions. A well-prepared pet emergency kit should include the following items:

- Water and portable water dish
- 3-day supply of food in airtight containers
- Medication and copies of medical records, including vaccination records
- Cat litter, litter box, and waste disposal bags
- Leashes or harnesses (even for cats)
- Toys and blankets to provide comfort and reduce stress
- Current photos in case your pet is lost
- Emergency contact information card, including contact information for your veterinarian

Evacuating and Sheltering With A Pet

A crucial aspect of pet preparedness is planning and knowing evacuation routes and shelter procedures. Prior to an emergency, pet owners should identify pet-friendly hotels and shelters. Determining how to safely transport a pet is also vital to the animal's safety. If needed, be sure to include a sturdy leash or carrier to the pet emergency kit. A pet emergency plan should also take into consideration the type of disaster that might occur i.e. hurricanes, floods, wildfires, etc. This might mean identifying multiple evacuation routes and conducting timed evacuation drills to ensure speed and efficiency during a real-world emergency.

Disaster organizations, such as the Red Cross, have specific protocols regarding sheltering pets. By understanding these regulations and identifying pet-friendly shelter locations in advance, pet owners can greatly reduce the stress associated with emergency pet care. Hurricane Forecasting

Flying into the Eye: The NOAA Hurricane Hunters

On Labor Day Weekend in 1935, cargo-ship generated forecast led many to believe a powerful hurricane was headed straight for Cuba. However, less than a day before the hurricane hit, a Pan Am pilot reported that the storm was further north than the ships' radars indicated. Leonard Povey, an American pilot living in Cuba, volunteered to conduct a flight mission to confirm the Pan Am pilot's report. He flew over the Florida Straits, located the center of the storm, and determined that the storm was, in fact, moving northward. Although Cuba was spared, the Florida Keys were not. The Labor Day Hurricane devastated the Florida Keys, killing over 400 people.

Povey's flight is the first recorded instance of aircraft being used to locate a hurricane. Recognizing its ability to improve forecasting and save lives, Leonard Povey became an advocate for such flights, lobbying Congress to establish a permanent organization to conduct tropical cyclone aerial reconnaissance missions. By 1944, the United States Army Air Force (USAAF) was conducting reconnaissance missions into tropical storms, with assistance from the United States Weather Bureau. In 1970, the United States Government officially established National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). Then, in 1976, the NOAA Hurricane Hunters flew their first official mission in a WP-3D Orion into Hurricane Bonny.



Today, the NOAA Hurricane Hunters are based out of the NOAA Aircraft Operations Center (AOC) at the Lakeland Regional Airport in Lakeland, Florida. Their hurricane reconnaissance fleet includes 2 WP-3D Orion and 1 Gulfstream IV airplanes, which are affectionately called Mrs. Piggy, Kermit, and Gonzo. These names helped the NOAA Hurricane Hunters bridge the gap between science and younger generations. In fact, Jim Henson, of Henson Productions, liked the idea so much, he agreed to create World War II-style nose art for each plane.

In support of their mission "Science, Service, and Stewardship," the NOAA Hurricane Hunters duties include weather research and data accumulation; overseeing fleet aircraft; and providing planning services for fisheries and coastal management. From 2019 to 2023, over 762 flights missions were completed by the NOAA Hurricane Hunters. When not flying reconnaissance missions, the NOAA Hurricane Hunters participate in training and simulation exercises; review aircraft regulations and policies; and conduct community outreach to educate the public on the importance of their missions. Through their courage and dedication, the NOAA Hurricane Hunters play a crucial role in enhancing the National Weather Services' ability to develop timely and accurate forecasts, which saves lives, and protects our communities.
