The City of Laurel's success is rooted in a guiding principle that shapes every decision made at City Hall: the citizens come first. Each day, the Mayor's Office works deliberately to deliver responsive, transparent, and effective local government.

At the center of this effort is a strong executive leadership team led by Mayor Keith R. Sydnor and supported by Chief of Staff Crystal Hypolite. Together, they form a unified leadership structure that turns ideas into action and policy into meaningful outcomes for Laurel residents.

As the City of Laurel's Chief Executive, Mayor Sydnor is responsible for setting the strategic vision that guides city operations. The Mayor ensures that ordinances and resolutions adopted by the City Council are faithfully enforced, reviews and signs or vetoes legislation, and presents the annual budget that supports all city services.

Sworn into office on November 27, 2023, Mayor Sydnor has prioritized open government, fiscal responsibility, and community engagement. He believes that good government starts with listening. Through appointments to boards, commissions, and committees, he ensures that residents have a direct voice in shaping the policies and priorities that affect their neighborhoods.

Mayor Sydnor emphasizes it takes teamwork to deliver high-quality service to City of Laurel residents. "I have a great staff. All the department heads are great. They have deputy directors; they manage the city. Without them we couldn't exist. We rely on their expertise and professional knowledge to do the work. They all play a vital role in this system."



Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day of Service Event Scheduled for January 19th

The City of Laurel is proud to host its annual Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day of Service, and Mayor Keith R. Sydnor and the Laurel City Council invite residents to participate on Monday, January 19, 2026, from 10:00am - 2:00pm. The event will take place at the Laurel Multiservice Center Gymnasium, located at 204 Fort Meade Road. This meaningful day honors Dr. King's legacy through service, unity, and community engagement.

This year's Day of Service will partner with Mayor Sydnor's Adopt-A-Senior Program, focusing on supporting Laurel's senior residents. The event will begin with a remembrance program at 10:00am, featuring guest speakers and musical selections by the Laurel High School Choir, followed by a hands-on volunteer activity assembling care packages for local seniors.

To support this initiative, the City of Laurel is seeking community donations to help assemble 200 care packages for local seniors. These contributions are essential to creating packages filled with items that provide comfort, warmth, and encouragement during the winter months. The following items are needed:

- Warm blankets
- Moisturizers and lip balm
- Winter items such as gloves, scarves, socks, and knit hats

When trees are waiting to be picked up by DPW, please remove any tinsel, lights, and decorations. They should also not be placed in plastic bags.

Eligibility:

To qualify, you must make \$69,000 or less, be a person with a disability, be a limited English speaking taxpayer, or be 60 years or older.

What to Bring:

Proof of identification (photo ID) for each filer, Social Security cards or ITIN letters for yourself, your spouse, and all dependents, all W-2 forms, 1099, and other income forms, Information for all deductions/credits such as childcare provider's name/TIN, education expenses, proof of health insurance coverage (Forms 1095-A, B, or C), a copy of last year's tax return, banking account and routing numbers (a voided check is best) for direct deposit of your refund, if married and filing jointly, both spouses must be present to sign the required forms.

✓ Document Checklist (What to Bring)

- Identification: Photo ID for each filer
- Tax IDs: Social Security cards or ITIN letters for yourself, spouse, and all dependents
- Income Forms: All W-2s, 1099s, and other income statements
- Health Insurance: Forms 1095-A, 1095-B, or 1095-C
- Deductions: Childcare provider information (Name/TIN), education expenses, etc.
- Banking: Account and routing numbers (a voided check is best) for direct deposit
- Past Returns: A copy of last year's tax return

Note: If filing jointly, both spouses must be present to sign.



Caring for Laurel's Pets

Low-Cost Veterinary Services Return to the City



Low-cost veterinary services are returning to the City of Laurel through a new partnership between Helping Every Animal Receive Treatment (H.E.A.R.T.) and Laurel Cats, bringing a mobile veterinary clinic directly to the community. The collaboration, supported by Mayor Keith R. Sydnor, Councilman James Kole, and the City of Laurel, aims to address the growing gap in affordable animal care following the rise in veterinary costs since COVID and the recent relocation of Spay Now's low-cost clinic out of Laurel.

Led by former Anne Arundel County animal control director Robin Catlett and veterinarians Dr. Mazzurco and Dr. Muller, H.E.A.R.T. operates a mobile clinic designed to reach communities where the need is the greatest.

The partnership marked a milestone on Tuesday, December 16, with a soft opening at the Laurel Parks and Recreation maintenance complex on Sandy Spring Road. Laurel Cats and its rescue partners had more than 20 cats spayed and neutered. Additional clinic sessions are scheduled for January, with plans to open services to the public for both cats and dogs in the near future. Organizers say the effort represents a major step forward for animal welfare in Laurel, demonstrating how community collaboration can restore essential services and improve outcomes for pets and their families.

Residents are encouraged to get involved to help make the clinic a permanent resource in Laurel. H.E.A.R.T. is accepting donations of clean towels (hand towels and especially large bath towels), which can be dropped off at the Laurel Cats food bank at 1200 Sandy Spring Road and labeled "HEART." The organization is also seeking weekday volunteers for roles ranging from check-in and animal transport to surgery prep, recovery assistance, cleaning, and laundry, with Spanish-speaking volunteers especially needed. Helping Neighbors Stay Warm Laurel Multiservice Center Accepting Adult Clothing Donations

Beginning on January 14th, the Craig A. Moe Laurel Multiservice Center will be accepting clothing donations for adults every Wednesday!

The Multiservice Center opened their clothes distribution site, The Clothes Closet, in 2024 and began accepting gently used items for those in need. The new process, which includes a set date and time for accepted drop-offs, comes from the manpower that was needed to help sort through these donation items based on seasonal needs.

“One of our partners offered to sort through our donation items and return what we are in need of based on the season,” Marchelle LeBlanc, the Director of the City of Laurel’s Human Services Department, said of the donation process. Once the items are returned to the Multiservice Center, they will be put in the Center’s Clothes Closet. Those in need can access The Clothes Closet during the Multiservice Center’s operating hours: Monday through Friday from 9am to 6pm.

Those that wish to donate can check the Laurel Multiservice Center’s website or social media pages to see what they are currently accepting and bring plastic bags containing clean, gently used adult clothing to the Multiservice Center (204 Fort Meade Rd., Laurel, MD) between 9am and 1pm. Someone from the Multiservice Center will be onsite to load the donated items onto a Department of Public Works vehicle to be sorted.

Something To Sing About Laurel High School Choir Wins Radio Contest

The holiday season just got a little brighter for Laurel High School. The Spartan Singers have officially claimed first place in 97.1 WASH-FM's Christmas Choir Competition, earning the coveted title of the best high school choir in the DMV.

After receiving an email from the radio station, choir director Kevin Lewis, who has led the program since 2018, asked the students if they wanted to participate. "We said we would give it shot, and we just did a recording, and the rest was kind of history," he said.

The Spartan Singers' rendition of "Carol of the Bells" captivated listeners, securing them a \$5,000 prize for the school's music program and an exclusive invitation to perform live at "Miracle on 34th Street, The Musical" at Capital One Hall on December 27, 2025.

This incredible achievement was powered by strong community support, with votes flooding in from residents, alumni, and local leaders. The prize money will help cover travel and expenses for 11 Spartan Singers selected for the Maryland All-State Chorus—a record-breaking milestone for Laurel High School. Just three years ago, only two students made All-State for the first time in school history. While Lewis can share information about music and programs in Maryland, the students' dedication makes the magic happen. "It's a testament to the work that they're putting in and the support that they give each other," he said. The momentum doesn't stop there. The Spartan Singers are riding a wave of success:

- 27 students earned spots in the PG County Honors Chorus this year, up from 22 last year and just 10 the year before.
- Recent performances have gone viral on TikTok and Instagram, drawing thousands of views.
- Their winter concert played to a packed house—a dramatic turnaround from previous years.

"We are truly grateful for 97.1 WASH-FM; we are grateful to the City of Laurel, to our fantastic Mayor Keith Sydnor, our principal Michael Dinkins, our department chair Francis Hammond, and a community of friends and family who helped to get us to this point, so thank you all so much," said Lewis.

"This is an extraordinary achievement for Laurel High School and a moment of pride for our entire community," said Keith R. Sydnor, Mayor of the City of Laurel. "The Spartan Singers have shown what is possible when talent, dedication, and community support come together. Their success on a regional stage reflects the excellence of our students and the strength of Laurel's arts programs."



Preparing for the Winter

Winter Weather: Hard to Predict, Easy to Plan For

Winter weather can look very different across the State of Maryland. Each year is unique – some covered in snow; others just extremely cold or windy. Winter hazards can include dangerously low temperatures, strong winds, snow, ice, sleet, and freezing rain. These hazards can cause power outages, damage, injuries, and death. However, there are plenty of ways to prepare so that the winter months can be enjoyed safely. For more information about winter weather preparedness, visit Ready.gov or Weather.gov.



Cold-Related Health Risks

Exposure to cold weather can cause frostbite and hypothermia, which can be life-threatening, especially to infants, small children, and the elderly. Understanding how to protect the body from excessive exposure to cold conditions is crucial when working outside or participating in winter activities. The following dressing guidelines can assist in reducing the risks associated with cold temperatures and low wind chills:

- Use light-weight and comfortable fabrics that trap the air warmed by the body.
- The first layer for cold weather exposure should keep you warm and dry. The best materials include synthetic fibers, which dry quickly and “wick” wetness away from the skin effectively.
- Clothing should be comfortable, light-weight, durable, and windproof. It is important to note that additional insulating layers may need to be added if the activity level tapers off.
- Outerwear should be appropriate for the activity, allow for ventilation, block the wind, and reduce heat loss.
- Cover your head, hands, and feet. Wear a hat and gloves that are breathable and waterproof. Footwear, including socks, should be durable, waterproof, and breathable. The tread should provide good traction, designed to grip the snow and ice.

Indoor Heating and Carbon Monoxide Safety

Throughout the winter season and during power outages, people look for alternative ways to heat their homes. Although space heaters, fireplaces, and generators can be useful, they can be extremely dangerous. According to the National Fire Protection Agency (NFPA), space heaters account for approximately 1/3 of home heating fires and 80% of home heating fire deaths annually. Below is a list of safety precautions that should be used with heating equipment:

- Keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet away from any heating equipment.
- Never use an oven to heat your home.
- Clean and inspect heating equipment annually.
- Turn off portable heaters and extinguish fireplaces before going to bed or leaving the house.
- Test smoke alarms monthly.


During the winter months, carbon monoxide (CO) exposures and poisonings occur more often due to the use of furnaces and heaters. CO is often referred to as the “silent killer” as it has no smell, taste, or color. Protect yourself and family by practicing indoor heating safety, understanding the symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning, and installing CO detectors. Symptoms of CO poisoning include: headache, dizziness, nausea, vomiting, mild confusion and shortness of breath.

If you are experiencing symptoms of CO exposure or poisoning, call 9-1-1 and seek medical care immediately. Healthcare professionals can check CO levels in your blood and treat you with oxygen. If you are unsure about exposure to CO, contact poison control 24 hours every day at 800-222-1222.

It is recommended that CO detectors be installed on every floor of your home. The detector should be placed near sleeping areas and be loud enough to wake you. If your CO detector sounds, do not ignore the alarm and perform the following actions:

- 1 Evacuate your home and move all people and pets towards fresh air.
- 2 Call 911 and report that you have an active CO alarm.
- 3 Wait for responders to check your home and make sure it is safe to reenter. Just because the alarm stops, does not mean it's safe. The source of the CO could still be producing gas.

Winter Travel Safety

In 2023, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, there were 302 fatal traffic crashes and an estimated 22,293 injury crashes that occurred when snow/sleet conditions were present.

When operating your vehicle in winter conditions, remember to slow down. It's harder to control or stop your vehicle on a slick or snow-covered surface. It is also important to increase your following distance enough so that you'll have plenty of time to stop for vehicles ahead of you. Additional safe driving tips include:

- Avoid using cruise control in wintry conditions.
- Steer in the direction of a skid. When your wheels regain traction, you won't have to overcorrect to stay in your lane.
- Accelerate and decelerate slowly.
- Increase following distances.
- If possible, avoid stopping when going uphill.

Preparing yourself and your vehicle is key to safe winter travel. In addition to annual maintenance, you can winterize your car in the following ways:

- Test your battery; battery power drops as the temperature drops.
- Check the tread of your tires and replace if less than 2/32 of an inch.
- Check tire pressure; like your battery, tire pressure is affected by temperature drops.
- Replace your wiper blades, if needed.
- Add wiper fluid that is rated for -30 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Keep your gas tank at least half full to avoid frozen gas lines.

Finally, you never know when you will encounter winter weather or an emergency road closure. Preparing a winter car emergency kit is extremely helpful should you become stranded. A kit should include the following items:

WSSC Water is participating in the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's enhanced Lead and Copper Rule, a nationwide public health initiative focused on identifying and removing sources of lead from drinking water systems. As part of this effort, WSSC Water will be conducting free water service line verification visits at selected homes within the City of Laurel in the coming weeks.

These visits are designed to confirm the type of pipe material that connects individual Laurel homes to the public water system. Verifying this information helps ensure service lines are safe and supports the long-term health and well-being of Laurel residents.

Clearly identified WSSC Water contractors will begin knocking on doors starting this month. Contractors will be wearing WSSC Water hard hats and carrying official WSSC Water photo identification badges. Homeowners will be asked to complete a short permission form allowing contractors to briefly enter the home to verify the pipe material, typically located in a basement, utility room, or crawl space.




Following the inspection, the contractor—Lead Free Group—will share the verification results directly with the homeowner. If no one is home at the time of the visit, a door hanger will be left with instructions on how to schedule an appointment or complete the verification using WSSC Water's online pipe type survey.

Even if a water service line is found to contain lead, it does not necessarily mean there is lead in the drinking water. WSSC Water carefully filters and treats all drinking water to ensure safety and quality, and all water leaving WSSC Water's filtration plants is lead-free.

Laurel residents can learn more about this public health initiative or verify their home's pipe materials by using WSSC Water's Self Survey Tool or visiting www.wsscwater.com/pipetype. WSSC Water is also available to provide virtual or in-person informational sessions upon request.

The City of Laurel and WSSC Water thank residents for their cooperation as this important work moves forward to help protect public health and maintain safe, high-quality drinking water throughout the community.
